#### LDWA EVENT

This Long Distance Walkers Association (LDWA) event starts and finishes in Goathland (Heartbeat, country). Most LDWA events are about 25 miles long and attract runners as well as walkers. Some of them seem to have evolved into races and the Tandem is one of these. As its name suggests it is particularly interesting because it is run in teams of two. The partners in each team run separate routes over the North York Moors for the first 20-22 miles, then meet up at Stape Village Hall and complete the last 6 miles together. Stape is the place to get rest, tea and cake, and put on some warm clothing, but only, of course, if you get there before your partner! On the other hand, you can also get stiff, cold and out of the mood if you have a long wait.

For the second year running with Jeff Winder I was doing the west route, which is said to be 10 minutes quicker than the east. Last year I ran myself into the ground getting to Stape and was there before Jeff. When he arrived and I tried to set off again my legs were taking no notice of my brain and I suffered a fair amount of (encouragement, from Jeff over the last 6 miles. Amazingly we still came fourth overall and won the vets prize (over 45).

This year I took it a bit more slowly over the first section (I didn't have any choice to be honest). The route is a mixture of road, track and footpaths through moorland and forest. There's not a lot of climbing, but some of it is quite exposed. We ran through a snowstorm on Glaisdale Moor, so it was a relief to get into Cropton Forest. Stiffness was a big problem as I shuffled into Stape. Jeff had flown there on the East route, arriving in second place, and been waiting for 20 minutes. Fortunately he's not really fit yet, but he's getting there (or so he tells me).

So it was straight in and out of the hall for me, no tea and cake. We were in sixth place. As I looked back I saw the seventh team coming out about 100 yards behind us. "Come on Rod, they're catching us!" was the refrain from Jeff (50 yards ahead) as we ran along three interminable three miles of road and track. They were gaining slightly, but I reckoned if I could hold them off until we reached the moor ahead we could probably beat them. We did pull away from them up the slight incline of the moor towards Two Howes. However, as soon as I was confident we had got the better of them we saw ahead of us another pair who had not been in view before. We were obviously gaining on them but they were several hundred yards in front. A couple of minutes later they were nearer to us and I knew that Jeff was thinking we could overhaul them. So was I but I didn't like to say so. Jeff was on the case again so I had to have a go at them. We caught them at the final checkpoint (Two Howes) and then it was flat out down through the heather to the road. We had to get well clear of them before we reached the road because I didn't fancy a sprint for the last half mile along the road in my state. As we got onto the road it was "Come on Rod, they're catching us!" again, but when I looked behind I couldn't even see them. I was going to say we beat them comfortably, but I should say I beat them very uncomfortably.

We took 4 hours 20 minutes. That is 13 minutes slower than last year, but we still came fifth overall and won the vets prize again. That means we've got to go for it next year to get a hat trick. So the pressure will be on.

The clear blue sky and calm, increasingly mild conditions did serious damage to the reputation of the Trog as 'The Beast'. So much so that we nearly had to call it off on the grounds that the weather was unsuitable for the race! Congratulations to lan Ferguson of Bingley, who broke his own race record by 37 seconds. Dave produced another excellent performance, to finish 3rd vet and 8th overall in an impressively fast time of 3 hours 7 minutes. The prizegiving was held outside in the glorious warm February sunshine - is this a sign of things to come or will normal service will be resumed from the weather next year?

There are a couple of significant trends developing in the race entries. Veterans made up 62% of the runners this year - the highest percentage ever, and an increase from about 50% in the early years of the race. More worrying is the progressive decline in numbers. There were 106 entries and 87 starters - the least in the history of the race. Numbers have fallen almost every year since 1993. This has led to various suggestions such as to call it the 'Teddy Bear' instead of the 'Beast'. The latest one is to incorporate a Half-Trog or 'Troglet' race into the event to increase entries. This would be a 10 mile race over the same route, but turning back at Cock Hill, therefore missing the loop to Withins and Walshaw.
